A Concept of Dramatic Genre and the Comedy of a New Type Jan 29 2020 Applying systems theory to the comedies of Chekhov, Balzac, Kleist, Moliere, and Shakespeare, *A Concept of Dramatic Genre and the Comedy of a New Type: Chess, Literature, and Film* approaches dramatic genre from the point of view of the degree of richness and strength of a character's potential. Its main focus is to establish a methodology for analyzing the potential from multidimensional perspectives, using systems thinking. The study investigates how Catherine expressed her social ideas throughout her drama and exploited the stage's power to promote political ideals and ideology. O'Malley sets close textual analysis within an historical framework, analyzing the major plays according to content, style, themes, characters, and relation to Catherine's life and political aims.

British Radio Drama Mar 13 2021 There has been little serious attempt in Britain to deal critically and historically with the subject of radio drama.
